

Challenges

Lack of an integrated analysis approach between different key resources. Sectoral scientific assessments might be perceived by policy-makers as an incomplete picture of the challenges and potential policy solutions for improved resource management.

Risk management measures

IRP members have accepted to take a more resource integrated approach and to undertake assessments on the nexus of key strategic resources (such as water, energy, land) and their environmental impacts over the full life cycle.

Challenges

With the momentum created through the Rio+20 process, many organisations are redirecting programmes towards GE, bearing a risk of overlap and competing offers to countries to support a GE transition.

Risk management measures

UNEP is actively engaging in partnerships with other organizations to implement activities and ensure synergies, e.g. with GIZ, UNDP, GGGI, ILO, Poverty and Environment Partnership -PEP, World Bank, OECD and UNITAR etc.

Challenges

In absence of level playing field, business might not be encouraged to invest in resource efficient, cleaner and safer production practices.

Risk management measures

Coordination of the intervention in the private sector with the advisory services provided by UNEP to the governments, both in the area of green economy and sustainable consumption and production.

Strategic partnerships

FAO, UNIDO, NCPCs, GRI, UN Global Compact, ISO UNEP FI & SBCI members, etc.



EA D - Enhancing sustainable consumption through more sustainable products and product information

Highlights

Launch of the Sustainable
Public Procurement Initiative,
supported by 30 organisations.
Pilot project being completed in
7 countries

Preparation of a project on SPP& Ecolabelling in 17-20 countries

10th Anniversary of the UNEP/SETAC Life Cycle Initiative *Greening the Economy Through Life Cycle Thinking*

Challenges

Difficulties of understanding what triggers consumer behaviour and to measure the change in such behaviours, as well as impact of UNEP related activities

Risk management measures

Work focusing on the sustainable consumption "enablers" (ie. public policies such as procurement and education, methodologies and tools to help define product sustainability and provide the basis for understandable, sound, transparent and verifiable product sustainability information)

Strategic partnerships

UNEP-SETAC LCI, ISO, WRI ICLEI, SUN , UNESCO, PERL, etc.



Looking ahead

- Delivering on the new partnerships/initiatives launched at Rio+20 (SPPI, GI-REC etc.) ; playing the role of a convenor AND delivering tangible outputs
- Operationalising the 10 Year Framework of Programmes:
 - General Assembly Resolution
 - Secretariat, Trust Fund, Clearinghouse
- Programme of Action on the Green Economy
